NICHIGETSUKAN DAITO-RYU AND JUDO — PART 1

The story goes back to the beginning of the Meiji Period (1868-1912), a time of modernization in which the samurai class was abolished and the wearing of swords was banned. The martial arts prior to this period tended to use swordsmanship as their central area of study (*kenjutsu*), but upon the warrior class being abolished in this period, the focus of martial arts training shifted to empty hand self-defense (*jujutsu*). This was the period in which Kano Jigoro founded Kodokan Judo (1882), and Takeda Sokaku revived the art of Daito-ryu Aikijujutsu (1887). During the early 20th century Kano and Takeda were in fact the most famous “jujutsu” exponents in Japan.

Takeda Sokaku was originally a highly skilled instructor of Ono-ha itto-ryu Kenjutsu, but following the period of instruction with his teacher in 1898, Saigo Tanomo (AKA: Hoshina Chikanori), he was admonished by him that the time of the sword was over. Although the classical arts (*koryu*) are often thought of as “ancient traditions” nowadays, they were once practical and cutting edge military arts, designed to adapt and develop with the times. As such, from this point forward Takeda discontinued dedicated instruction in swordsmanship in favor of spreading Aikijujutsu. Takeda was also on the cutting edge of the method of transmission, adopting a headquarters / branch (*honbu / shibu*) system throughout Japan to transmit his art widely. This innovative new system was also used by Kano Jigoro around the same time to promote Judo.

It turns out that Kano and Takeda knew each other quite well. Takeda Sokaku’s son recounted the following about it in an interview that was translated and published in the book “Conversations with Daito-ryu Masters”, pg. 68:

"Yes, [Kano Jigoro and Takeda Sokaku] met many times. Mr. Kano and Sokaku were close friends, since they were both martial artists of similar age. They met each other often in Tokyo. Mr. Kano created judo based on the Kito-ryu and Tenjin shin'yo-ryu Jujutsu schools. Sokaku had also practiced classical martial arts. Kano created his system as a method of physical education. The difference

between Daito-ryu and Judo is that we do not have one-on-one matches in Daito-ryu."

Since Takeda and Kano were born only a year apart from each other, it turns out that they spread their arts about the same time. The oral tradition (*kuden*) of Daito-ryu states Takeda Sokaku targeted adult government officials and other prominent people for instruction (especially military and police) at the recommendation of his teacher, who hoped that austere training in aiki would polish the character of those in positions of power. Kano, on the other hand, created Judo with the intent of targeting the world's youth, in hopes of improving their development. Both hoped to use their arts as a way of promoting world peace, either purposely or coincidentally while targeting the opposite generations.

Ueshiba Morihei, a senior instructor under Takeda Sokaku who later founded “Aikido”, once performed a public demonstration in which Kano was present. It seems that Kano was impressed enough with what he saw to warrant dispatching a handful of his disciples, to include Tomiki Kenji and Mochizuki Minoru, to cross-train with Ueshiba. The most notable result of this cross training was the Judo “*Goshinjutsu no Kata*” (self-defense form), created largely from the influence of Tomiki in 1956. This *Goshinjutsu no Kata* contains fundamental jujutsu techniques clearly evolved from Daito-ryu Aikijujutsu.


According to second generation Kodokan Headmaster, Kano Rise ca. 1958, some of the *Kime no kata* techniques were also borrowed from “Aikijujutsu”.

It is unknown if the famous Judo-ka Mifune Kyuzo was among those who cross-trained with Ueshiba, but it's interesting to note that he was perhaps most famous for his "air throws" (*kukinage*), which are reminiscent of the *aikinage* throws of Daito-ryu.

The branch of Daito-ryu Aikijujutsu taught at the SGJCC is from the Kodokai Branch. The Kodokai was the first branch of Daito-ryu established in America, beginning in 1973. That's the year that Yonezawa Katsumi came to San Luis Obispo from Japan under the sponsorship of the EDI program. Yonezawa was a Daito-ryu Aikijujutsu Kodokai instructor who was also a 4th Degree Judo Instructor, and as such connected quickly with the USJF Coastal Judo Dojo there. At the time Kiyama Hayawo was a 2nd Degree Judo Assistant Instructor at the dojo. Eventually Kiyama Sensei took over as chief instructor of the Coastal Judo Dojo and began teaching Daito-ryu there as well.

The *Nichigetsukan Dojo* was founded at the SGJCC in 2005, continuing this cooperative friendship between Judo and Aikijujutsu as the two arts reach forward with missions of peace. Judo was in fact the first martial art I studied as a teenager back in 1980, and I've always held a fondness for it. I'll discuss the historical relationship between Aikijujutsu and Judo a bit more in the next issue.
